## Dr. T. Leonard Lewis, 1903-1959

Born in Springfield, Mo., Theodore Leonard Lewis spent most of his youth in Oklahoma. Before his birth he was dedicated to the ministry and at the age of ten confessed Christ as his Saviour. His wedding day in 1920 also saw him yield his life, as best he knew how, to the Lordship of Jesus Christ. He finished Moody Bible Institute in 1927 and received the Ph.B. at Wheaton College, Ill., in 1931.

In 1929 he became pastor of the Harrison St. Congregational Church in Oak Park, Ill.; and for twelve happy years he knew the joy of teaching the Bible and of challenging young people to enter the service of Christ and saw the church membership increase sevenfold. During this time he earned the B. D. and Th. D. degrees at Northern Baptist Theological Seminary and in 1941 was called to the chair of theology.

He became president of Gordon College in 1944. From his pen came devotional articles for the quarterly, Seek; and he preached the Word with power in churches large and small. He served as a correspondent for Christianity Today and United Evangelical Action.

Dr. Lewis was a charter member (59-1950) of the Evangelical Thelogical Society. For some time he served as Chairman of the College and Seminary Division of the Commission on Educational Institutions of the National Association of Evangelicals. In 1950 he received from Staley College the degree of Doctor of Art of Oratory, and in 1958 Western New England College conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Letters.

Wherever he went, he preached Jesus Christ and Him crucified. His life was dedicated to the Savior and reflected the glory of the One he served. Then on March 12, 1959, his valiant heart stopped beating and God took him home. Truly his was a life lived not for self but for Christ. "The Lord gave, and the Lord hath taken away; blessed be the name of the Lord."

## Dr. Thomas B. Meadows, 1882-1959

Temple Baptist Theological Seminary lost a genuine Christian scholar by the homegoing of Professor Thomas B. Meadows, 77, on October 5, 1959. Trained in many educational institutions, Dr Meadows held the following degrees: B.S. (1911) and M.S. (1913), Alabama Polytechnic Institute; M.A. (1916) and Ph.D. (1923), Peabody College for Teachers; M.A. (1928), Columbia University; Ed.D. (1933), Indiana University; M.A. (1950), Winona Lake School of Theology.

Dr. Meadows was the author of the following books: Personality and Intelligence Tests, Study Manual in Educational Psychology, Old Testament Characters in Rhyme, School Gardens in the South, Status of Agricultural Projects in the South, Objective Study Units for Students of the Old Testament, Objective Study Units for Students of the New Testament, Guidance to the Study of the Old Testament (N.Y.: Vantage, 1954), Guidance to the Study of the New Testament (Same: 1955), Psychology of Learning and Teaching Christian Education (N.Y.: Pageant Press, 1957), and Teacher's Guide (Same: 1958).

Dr. Meadows was a man of wide experience, holding high the torch and flame of deep-rooted Christian convictions. He was a friend of Christian youth and taught two generations of students in schools of higher learning. He was a respected authority in the field of psychology and in the special science of tests and measurements.

He has been a member of the Evangelical Theological Society for the last two years (547-1958) and held membership in a number of other learned societies. Who's Who in American Education listed him as a competent scholar and psychologist. The E.T.S. lost in him a warm friend, Christian scholar, and active promoter. The Lord took His servant home, where he sees his Master, the Lord Jesus Christ, whom he loved with all his heart.
